WHEREAS, Virginia Tech's "Principles of Shared Governance" incorporated in the University Council Constitution and Bylaws state, in part: "...[I]n the rare instances exigent circumstances require university leaders to act outside the structure of shared governance, they will explain the exigent circumstances and discuss the action or actions taken in open forums and in a timely manner..."; and

WHEREAS, President Sands informed the University Council Cabinet on September 1, 2025 of a decision to repeal CGPSP 2017-18A Resolution to Incorporate an Inclusion and Diversity Education Component into Graduate Education and PPM 307 in their entirety; and

WHEREAS, on October 6, 2025, President Sands informed the University Council and the university community of the same decision; and

WHEREAS, the University Council Cabinet approved the Commission on Graduate and Professional Studies and Policies and Faculty Senate to recommend subsequent actions that should be taken;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Faculty Senate recognizes the authority of the President to take such actions "in the rare instances exigent circumstances require university leaders to act outside the structure of shared governance," as codified in the Virginia Tech Principles of Shared Governance in the University Council Constitution, but asserts that the curriculum of the university's graduate degree programs is the purview of the faculty; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Commission on Graduate and Professional Studies and Policies will explore alternative curricular avenues that are in alignment with

the Principles of Community, reflecting the values of Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University as an institution that highly values diversity, including diversity of thought and experience, and fosters an inclusive environment, encouraging a culture of opportunity for all, which immensely enriches our campus, and is committed to providing every student an education that is free from discrimination and grounded in merit; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that t newly proposed graduate programs, policies, practices, and actions in every regard will comply with the Equal Protection Clause of the U.S. Constitution, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and other federal civil rights laws. This includes, but is not limited to: admissions, hiring, promotion, compensation, financial aid, scholarships, prizes, administrative support, discipline, housing, graduation ceremonies, and all other aspects of student, academic, and campus life.

Comments on CGPSP 2025-26B Resolution Affirming Administrative Action Under Exigent Circumstances

The A/P Faculty Senate Polices and Issues Committee has reviewed and approves/endorses the CGPSP 2025-26B Resolution Affirming Administrative Action Under Exigent Circumstances.

Although the resolution received majority approval and endorsement from the A/P Faculty Senators, we are providing all submitted comments for your awareness and thoughtful consideration. A formal response to these remarks is not required:

I do not recall A/P Faculty Senate being consulted or informed that the exigent circumstances clause was in effect when decisions were made relevant to this language of this resolution. Therefore, to affirm ex post facto an action that is now communicated as due to necessity strikes me as redundant. I see no necessity to this Resolution, apart from a public affirmation of the authority already vested in the university's leadership structure to make decisions in exigent circumstances as its sees fit for the good of the university.

I do not think this decision benefits our community and that it was done in haste. This is reactionary and constituencies were not given the chance to respond before the decision was made.
