#### COMMISSION ON OUTREACH AND INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS Minutes December 9, 2021; 3:30-4:30 p.m. 120 Gateway Center and Zoom

**Welcome:** After a delay due to audio/visual issues, Robert Weiss called the meeting to order at 3:35 p.m. and welcomed the group. Self-introductions were made; attendees signed the attendance sheet; those participating by Zoom signed into the chat; visual attendance was also taken; a quorum was established.

#### 1. Adoption of Agenda:

Robert Weiss called for a motion to approve the agenda; a motion was made; seconded; no discussion; all were in favor; the agenda was approved.

#### 2. Announcement of Approval of Minutes, November 18, 2021:

Minutes from the November 18, 2021 meeting were sent out electronically for edits and were approved electronically. Minutes were sent to the Governance Information System; and can be found on the web (<u>http://www.governance.vt.edu/</u>).

3. <u>Presentation: Study Abroad Programs:</u> Theresa Johansson gave a presentation on Study Abroad Programs (see attached). The presentation included information about students receiving credit while abroad; and fees collected to pay for lodging while abroad in addition to regular Virginia Tech tuition and fees students must pay. The pandemic has effected the numbers for Study Abroad, much work is being done to get the numbers back to pre-COVID numbers. There are not any incentives to encourage Study Abroad; the PIBB model does not encourage Study Abroad; the majority of students will not participate in Study Abroad. The goal is to get to 30% of students on a Study Abroad program. COIA was instrumental in getting GEO scholarship money to have students participate; a couple of major gifts also helped in scholarships; but there is no system for dedicated money to The goal for the future is to offer courses in inter-culture provide for scholarships. competencies as a career bridge. Theresa spoke about the Passport Program (https://www.globaleducation.vt.edu/Homepage.html); that enables students to obtain a U.S. Passport at no cost; with a grant paying for 25 student passports and the Global Education Office (GEO) matching an additional 25.

Guru Ghosh commented that we need to be proactive about experiential experiences long before students' Junior Year. Discussion included getting administration focused on global experiential experiences; as well as fitting it into their required course schedules. Robert Weiss offered that members could email additional thoughts and questions to him and we could devise an agenda including conversations around experiential learning.

#### 4. Acceptance of Constituent Reports and/or Minutes:

- A. <u>Chairman's Report</u>: Robert Weiss indicated that the December 6, 2021 University Council did not include any resolutions that were impacting COIA, there was a presentation from TLOS; approved University Council meeting minutes can be found at: <u>https://governance.vt.edu/meeting-materials.php</u>.
- B. <u>Virginia Cooperative Extension (VCE)</u>: Ed Jones spoke about a civil rights compliance review coming up in February; which they are prepared for. Guru spoke about Ed's upcoming retirement and his willingness to stay on until a new administrator could be named.
- C. Engagement Leadership Council: Kimberly Rhodes read the report from Susan Short regarding the Engagement Leadership Council meeting of December 2, 2021. An announcement from the Center for Economic and Community Engagement related to an upcoming op-ed in the Richmond Times Dispatch written by Margaret Cowell and Sarah Lyon-Hill entitled: As election dust settles in Virginia, don't forget the urban-rural ties that binds us; presentation from Scott Weimer, executive director of Roanoke Regional Initiatives, focused on current and emerging programs and partnerships. In addition, Scott shared with the group a feature in the Roanoke Higher Education Center annual report highlighting Virginia Tech's Counselor Education master's degree program. He also announced that Virginia State University will become a member institution at the Roanoke Higher Education Center beginning in January, 2022. Announcements related to upcoming OIA Sesquicentennial Commonwealth tours scheduled for March and June and the potential development of a graduate certificate focused on the scholarship of engagement. Guru announced that the Inn at Virginia Tech and Skelton Conference Center is transitioning from the leadership team of Benchmark to Crestline Hotels and Resorts. In addition, he shared that leadership for the Inn will transfer from Outreach and International Affairs to the Business Affairs division. The next guarterly meeting of the Council is scheduled for March 3, 2022.
- D. <u>University Committee on International Affairs (UCIA)</u>: Theresa Johansson reported on the November 22, 2021 UCIA meeting. The meeting included an update to the UCIA Bylaws and membership roster; the working groups have not yet met and there was no update for those groups.

#### 5. <u>Call for Announcements/Commission Board Member Comments:</u>

Robert Weiss made the call for announcements/comments. There was concern about International travel and COVID procedures. Guru suggested that Don Hempson could speak at the next meeting in relation to pro-active guidance on faculty planning for programs abroad and decisions from the Global Travel Oversight Commission (GTOC).

6. <u>Adjournment:</u> There being no further business, Robert Weiss thanked the group for attending; a motion to adjourn the meeting was made; seconded; all were in favor; the meeting adjourned at 4:34 p.m.
